

Mandy Manning 2018 National Teacher of the Year

Mandy teaches English to newly arrived refugee and immigrant students in the Newcomer Center at Joel E. Ferris High School in Spokane, Washington. In her classroom, Mandy uses experiential projects like mapmaking to help her students process trauma, celebrate their home countries and culture, and learn about their new community. As 2018 National Teacher of the Year, Mandy has been encouraging educators to teach their students to overcome their fears and seek out new experiences.

Mandy earned a Bachelor of Arts from Eastern Washington University, a Masters of Arts from West Texas A & M University, and a Masters of Fine Arts from Northwest Institute of Literary Arts. Mandy is a National Board Certified Teacher.

Kara teaches a fourth and fifth grade classroom in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) at Delalio Elementary School in Camp Lejuene, North Carolina. She uses project based learning and hands on modeling to engage her students and inspire the girls in her classroom to pursue STEM in their future studies and careers.

Kara earned her Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education and Special Education from Towson University and went on to earn a Masters of Education with a Specialization in Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment from Walden University. Ms. Ball was a finalist for the Presidential Award for Excellence in Math and Science Teaching, and was a finalist for 2018 National Teacher of the Year.

Tammie spent the first 7 years of her career in Southern California working on the Space Shuttle Program for Rocketdyne International. She then spent 15 years as a science teacher at Cheney Middle School, and since has worked on numerous projects at the local and national level advocating for STEM in schools. In her current role, she oversees science curriculum and programming for 59 school districts in Eastern Washington.

Tammie has her Bachelor of Science in Education and Biology, a Masters of Arts in Education and Teaching At Risk Students, and is currently a Ph.D. candidate writing her dissertation on Leadership and Policy in the Classroom.
