• Engaging New Volunteers: When we put the call out for new volunteers, our Section exceeded my expectations by how many volunteered and how much time they dedicated! Cricket Slattery has helped on the Section and state-wide levels with the 2018 Pennsylvania Report Card on Infrastructure. SCIENCE FAIRS — PROJECTS REVIEWED, WINNERS SELECTED

We know that Engineers often have trouble counting, but we believe from our records that our Section has been participating in the Delaware Valley Science Fairs for 26 years, as of the most recent Fairs on April 4. (We suspect the administration of the Fairs has the same "affliction", as it awarded our participants 20-year pins last year...) In any event, our intrepid judges attended the Fairs to review student projects and find the winners of our Section's Special Awards. This team, led as always by Past President Chris Rood, ably assisted by Past President Bob Wright and kept in check by "the rookie" Michael Lembo, spent most of the day at the Greater Philadelphia Expo Center in Oaks to serve as judges for our Special Awards. These Awards recognize a first and second place finisher in individual projects in the Grades 6-8 and Grades 9-12 categories.

The plural in the Science Fairs title is not a typo, as the event is a compilation of 13 different science fairs across a fairly large geographic area, stretching to the Jersey Shore, all of Delaware, and the Lehigh Valley, bringing students whose projects have won school district and local contests to compete on a regional level. The top medal winners at the Fairs can move on to the International Science and Engineering Fair later this spring.

We always are hopeful that we are able to recognize and encourage some future Engineers who we believe are deserving of special honor. Our judging team held to its usual goals of efficiency and efficacy, reviewing most of the over 900 individual student efforts to find those with some Engineering potential. Despite the projects being classified into various science disciplines, including Engineering, our judges often find that they must review many projects in other areas such as physics, earth sciences, environmental sciences, and mathematics that may touch on the ubiquitous nature of Civil Engineering. Sometimes these projects cross different disciplines, and sometimes they are merely misplaced. The high quality of many of the entries only serves to complicate the decision-making process.

After a lot of reviewing, which involved a good deal of walking around the expanse of the Expo Center, our intrepid team sorted through and short-listed several projects and came up with two winners in each of the categories of Grades 6-8 and Grades 9-12.

The winning students and their projects were:

Grades 9-12 First Place Nathan Nazareth 10th Grade Central Bucks High School – West, Doylestown, PA "Minimizing Earthquake Casualties"

Grades 9-12 Second Place Sydney Iseminger

12th Grade Bishop Shanahan High School, Downingtown, PA "Concrete Facts"

Successful Civil Engineers always tell me they developed their speaking abilities, their confidence, and their network, by taking on leadership roles in professional associations.

I know what you're thinking — "I don't have time to take on more responsibilities." Well, I am here to tell you that, actually, you can't afford not to.

10 BENEFITS THAT YOU CAN REAP FROM A LEADERSHIP ROLE IN A PROFESSIONAL ASSOCIATION You will:

- Work on and improve your management skills in some capacity
- Improve your communication skills by collaborating with other volunteers
- · Become more known in your industry and community by being more visible
- Build a network of other motivated professionals who are also volunteering
- Make friends (I know this sounds like something you would focus on in elementary school, but building friendships is satisfying throughout life)
- · Gain confidence by speaking in front of groups of people
- Show your company that you are a leader
- Drive positive change and growth in your field through your volunteer work
- Improve your productivity skills, because you'll have to, in order to fit this work in
- Open yourself up to an unlimited amount of career opportunities

I could keep going, but I think you get the point. So why don't you do it right now? Go ahead, write an email to your local society leader and tell them you'd like to get involved at a leadership level.

If you still have doubts, just keep reading the 10 points above until you're ready.

"The Sons of Martha" was written by poet Rudyard Kipling in 1907. It was inspired by the biblical story of Jesus at the home of Martha and Mary and celebrates the care and dedication of workers who perform their duties, mainly unseen and often unrecognized or cited, for the safety and comfort of others. Many have called this the "Engineers' poem" for that reason. We offer this as an end-of-season read for you.

The Sons of Mary seldom bother, for they have inherited that good part; But the Sons of Martha favour their Mother of the careful soul and troubled heart. And because she lost her temper once, and because she was rude to the Lord her Guest, Her Sons must wait upon Mary's Sons, world without end, reprieve, or rest. It is their care in all the ages to take the buffet and cushion the shock. It is their care that the gear engages; it is their care that the switches lock.

It is their care that the wheels run truly; it is their care to embark and entrain, Tally, transport, and deliver duly the Sons of Mary by land and main. They say to mountains, 'Be ye removed'. They say to the lesser floods, 'Be dry'. Under their rods are the rocks reproved – they are not afraid of that which is high. Then do the hill-tops shake to the summit – then is the bed of the deep laid bare, That the Sons of Mary may overcome it, pleasantly sleeping and unaware.

They finger death at their gloves' end where they piece and repiece the living wires. He rears against the gates they tend: they feed him hungry behind their fires. Early at dawn, ere men see clear, they stumble into his terrible stall, And hale him forth like a haltered steer, and goad and turn him till evenfall. To these from birth is Belief forbidden; from these till death is Relief afar. They are concerned with matter hidden – under the earthline their altars are;

The secret fountains to follow up, waters withdrawn to restore to the mouth, And gather the floods as in a cup, and pour them again at a city drouth. They do not preach that their God will rouse them a little before the nuts work loose. They do not teach that His Pity allows them to leave their work when they damn-well choose.

As in the thronged and the lighted ways, so in the dark and the desert they stand. Wary and watchful all their days that their brethren's days may be long in the land.

Raise ye the stone or cleave the wood to make a path more fair or flat: Lo, it is black already with blood some Son of Martha spilled for that: Not as a ladder from earth to Heaven, not as a witness to any creed, But simple service simply given to his own kind in their common need. And the Sons of Mary smile and are blessed – they know the angels are on their side. They know in them is the Grace confessed, and for them are the Mercies multiplied.

They sit at the Feet – they hear the Word – they see how truly the Promise Runs: They have cast their burden upon the Lord, and – the Lord He lays it on Martha's Sons.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT REQUIREMENTS UPDATE

As you may be aware, professional engineers, land surveyors and geologists in many states are required to obtain continued professional development (CPD) credit to renew their licenses in many states. Locally, this includes Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Delaware.

There is a bit of a "double whammy" for some of you (us?) this year. New Jersey PE's will expire on April 30 and if you have one you have likely already received your renewal notice (and the more intrepid of you likely have already taken care of this). Delaware PE's will expire on June 30. For each state, license renewal will require the licensee to certify that he/she has earned the required 24 professional development hours' (PDH) worth of valid instruction, training and/or education in the licensing period. There is allowable carryover for PDH's that were earned prior to the last license renewal but not applied to that renewal. Thus, if you need some PDH's to get "there", now may be the time to start scurrying around to find them.

As you may also be aware, our Section's meeting program is generally able to count toward your continuing education requirement (meetings that the Section believes would not count will be prefaced as such in the meeting announcement) for many states (New York and Florida being two exceptions where coursework preapproval by the state board is required). We also offer various Technical Group and YMF meetings and events that offer PDH credit. We continue to have a verification program in place to help our members obtain and track PDH's. Also, through our monthly meeting schedule, we generally offer at least a half-dozen opportunities for you to pick up PDH's. Over a two-year licensure period, this could amount to half of what one needs to meet many states' requirements.

Also, you may have noticed that you can earn up to 5 PDH's by choosing to attend up to 5 ondemand webinars offered by National as a free benefit of your membership. There is a list of over 60 such webinars from which you can choose. Information on this is available in the Membership section of the ASCE National website (asce.org).

And for those of you who don't yet have PE after your name and may be considering "taking the plunge" for an upcoming PE exam in the future, please check ASCE's live exam review courses. This allows one to interact with instructors during live webinars and access free on-demand recordings 24/7 until the exam date. The courses reference codes specified by NCEES for the exam. You can feel confident with the most comprehensive and convenient way to prepare for and pass the exam. More information is available on the ASCE National website (asce.org).

And a possible tip on renewal – in Delaware the administrators of PE licensure have advised PE's that there is greater likelihood that those who wait until the last minute to renew will be audited. As we were always told in grade school (and apparently remembered), a word to the wise is sufficient.
