## **Call for Nominations and Volunteers**

The Seattle Section is seeking nominations for Board positions as well as volunteers for our technical and standing committees. We will hold elections for new Board members starting May 18. Our open positions include:

• President Elect: The term includes one year each as President Elect, then President, and Immediate Past President (for a total of 3 years). The President Elect serves as President in the absence of



- the President and also serves as Membership Chair. The President Elect also attends and acts as the Section's Delegate to the Presidents and Governors Forum (generally held in September at ASCE Headquarters) and the Workshop for Section and Branch Leaders (WSBL) (generally held in January or February). The President Elect shall also attend the Spring Region 8 Board of Governors (R8 BOG) and Assembly (R8 BOG) which is generally held immediately prior to the WSBL.
- **Secretary:** The Secretary has responsibility for the Section's records. The Secretary's key duties include keeping minutes at the Board meetings, conducting the Section elections, maintaining the roster of offers and committee chairs, and compiling records for archiving.
- Director of Standing Committees: This is a 3-year term with responsibilities including making recommendations to the President regarding members who may be willing to serve as chairs, providing training, guidance, and/or assistance to committee leaders, act as committee advocate to the Board, and encourage committee activities that will foster ASCE goals and enhance member activities. Examples of committees that the Director of Standing Committees oversees are Audit, Diversity, History & Heritage, House & Hospitality, Public Relations, Professional Practice, Community Service, and Scholarship committees. Specific duties include preparing a monthly report, attending monthly Board meetings, and working closely with various committee chairs.

# 2015 Richard Williamson Jones Memorial Award

The Seattle Section has selected Mr. Jacob DeBernardi as the 2015 Richard Williamson Jones Memorial Award recipient. Mr. DeBernardi is a student at the University of Washington and is studying structural and construction engineering. Jacob has been involved in the Steel Bridge and Concrete Canoe competitions and is serving as an ASCE Student Chapter Officer. Jacob is both a President's Scholar and a Dean's Scholar.

The Richard Williamson Jones Memorial Scholarship was established by his wife, Kathie, because Richard often commented that when he was a student, he would have been much better off if he had just had a little more money for books and supplies. The scholarship continues through Kathie Jones' estate.

Richard Jones was a civil engineer and a member of the Seattle Section of ASCE, when he died in an airplane crash at the age of 53. He was a graduate of the University of Washington and was admitted as a Member of the Society in 1949 and as a Fellow in 1959. Mr. Jones joined General Construction Company in 1933 where he worked on many projects in the Seattle and Portland area, including the Bonneville Dam and as Chief Engineer on the Hungry Horse Dam. At the time of his death, he was Executive Vice President of General Construction Company.

The maximum scholarship amount distributed annually is \$2,000.

#### Past Events

- o February 2 Networking and Officers' Meeting (Bellevue) [12 YMs]. The ASCE YMF met up at Palomino in downtown Bellevue on an unseasonably warm Monday night for some food and drinks. Upcoming YMF events were discussed including WRYMC and the ski retreat with the Portland District YMF. Thankfully, a large table was unoccupied when the group arrived, so everyone could sit at one table despite the high turnout.
- o February 4 STEM-A Family Night (K-12 Outreach event) [2 YMs]. We had two people from YMF attend the STEM-A Family Night at the Future of Flight Museum. We had a booth up for kids to build a gumdrop domes to learn how strong triangles are. We also tried to get kids to build a bridge out of paper and see how many pennies it would hold. I think we probably had about 100 kids visit our booth.
- o February 7 Popsicle Stick Bridge Competition 2015 [43 YMs]. On Saturday February 7th 2015 we had a group of ~40 volunteers arrive at the Seattle Museum of Flight bright and early in the morning to begin the final set up. The event lasted from 7am through 1 pm where 23 schools with 63 teams showed up to compete in the 20th Annual Popsicle Stick Bridge Competition. The winning bridge was able to hold 889 pounds, despite our innovated and challenging set of design challenges we incorporated into the building code this year. Challenges included the "no build zone" at the midspan of the bridge, requiring teams to design abutments to lift their deck spans up and over the "Navigation Channel."

- Additionally, we added the requirement that the decks must be flat and continuous. Many teams struggled with these added design challenges, but so too did many teams overcome these challenges. The 20th Annual PSB competition was one the largest competition to date, in terms of number of teams that competed, as well as broke the record for best fundraising success, bringing in \$5,350 in donations. Following the competition, which was completed and cleaned up ahead of schedule, volunteers reconvened at Henry's Tavern to celebrate a successful event.
- o February 7 PSEC Engineering Fair [8 YMs]. Our booth was set up with the shake table we borrowed by MKA. We have several stations for kids to build structures with skewers and gumdrops. We then took their structures and uses the MKA shake table to simulate the lateral motion of an earthquake. We had over 130 different kids visit the table with most either building their own structure or working in teams to build one. We handed out quite a few pamphlets with other activities for kids and pencils to many of the visitors to our booth. The event appeared to be a big success in getting kids interested in buildings. One kid returned several different times to build even bigger structures. Many kids had a natural inclination to add bracing to their buildings and understood that they needed to build bigger bases to support taller buildings. Parents were very happy to let their kids get so involved in building. Very few structures failed. It might be advantageous to look into different connective material so some can fail (some of the kids wanted to see catastrophic failure).

   The Seattle networking event on 2/10 was held at McMenamins Six Arms. Approximately 10 people were in attendance including two members of SEAW to discuss the upcoming join ASCE/SEAW Golf Tournament. Everyone had a great time discussing a successful Popsicle Stick Bridge, the weekend before, and enjoying some delicious Cajun tots and other snacks.
