Welcome to the Spring issue of The ASCE Wisconsin Section newsletter. As spring finally appears to have arrived and summer is right around the corner, activity around the Section is growing!

Much of the activity at the Section level is focused around the report card efforts. The latest national report card released by ASCE in 2017 included numbers from Wisconsin showing drinking water needs at an estimated \$1 billion, wastewater needs totaling \$6.33 billion, and \$836 million in an estimated capital expenditure gap for the state's schools. The national report card also estimated that approximately 28% of the state's roads are in poor condition and 8.7% of the bridges are rated as structurally deficient, costing each Wisconsin driver \$736 per year from having to drive on roads in need of repair. These numbers are an indication of the need for additional funding for our road systems, drinking water and wastewater facilities, schools, and other infrastructure facilities. As the budget process plays out for the state of Wisconsin over the next several months, our legislators will be discussing funding levels that could either start to fix some of these issues or push these numbers higher. As professionals in the industry, we are

some of the greatest advocates for the need for additional infrastructure funding. This can be in the form of conversations with family and friends or with your state representatives.

Although record amounts of snow were still evident, the 2019 ASCE Wisconsin Section Spring Technical Conference took place at the Davies Center at the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire on March 14th, 2019. The keynote speaker, Karrie Landsverk, delivered a presentation, "Open Your Silos and Feed Your Organization," which focused on increasing collaboration and connections across organizations. As with other ASCE technical conferences for our Section, three Technical Sessions were offered, in addition to an Ethics presentation, as well as an Awards Presentation.

The technical sessions included topics pertaining to Geotechnical, Structures, Leadership and Management, Transportation, Construction, and Environmental and Water Resources. Several presentations focused on local projects including the Eau Claire Half Moon Lake Bridge and Causeway, the downtown Eau Claire Confluence Development, and the River Prairie Development in Altoona; as well as projects elsewhere such as the Sentry Insurance Corporate Headquarters located in Stevens Point, and a Wharf Wall Failure and Repair project located in Milwaukee.

Given the date was March 14th, "Pi Day" was heartily celebrated with ice cream and "pie" for the afternoon break between the awards and the final technical session. A special thank you goes out to the ASCE Northwest Region Planning Committee, and the Davies Center staff, for their work and effort to make the conference a success!

The ASCE federal government fly-in was held on March 13, 2019. The fly-in is an annual event where ASCE representatives from all around the country converge in Washington, D.C. for meetings with their Congressmen and women. The Washington staff of ASCE coordinates all arrangement, and the schedules for the member meetings 'on the hill.' The 2019 Wisconsin delegates to the legislative fly-in included Carl Sutter (Region 3 Director), Bob Bryson (ASCE National Transportation Policy Committee), Tony Castle (Southeast Branch Director-at-Large), and Greg Schroeder (Advocacy Captain).

The Washington staff is to be commended on an excellent and fast paced program both prior to and after arrival in D.C. Bradley Fitch of the Congressional Management Foundation provided training in all aspects of effective advocacy. Neil Pedersen, executive director of the Transportation Research Board, reviewed the report "Renewing the National Commitment to the Interstate Highway System." Representatives Earl Blumenauer (D-OR) and Rodney Davis (R-IL) spoke to the entire ASCE group on the potential for moving infrastructure legislation forward.

All four Wisconsin delegates met with both Wisconsin senate offices. Neither senator was available, but both provided aides. The legislative assistants are powerful members of the congressional offices and it is commonplace for lobbying efforts to be directed through them.

The Tiffany Jewel – 150 Years of Railroad Service By: James F. Heidt, PE

This year marks the 150th anniversary of the completion of a little-known engineering located in the state of Wisconsin – the Tiffany Jewel Bridge in Tiffany, Wisconsin. Celebrated by locals as the only five-arch masonry railroad bridge in the state, the 386-foot bridge spans 43 feet above Turtle Creek, in Rock Count. Planning is underway for a celebration of the bridge for the weekends of September 8th and 15th, 2019, to be held at the Turtle Creek Parkway site on Smith Road, Rock County, Wisconsin. The local committee is looking for support from the state engineering community to recognize the bridge as a historic engineering structure.

Known by the railroad as bridge no. 128, the Tiffany Jewel was completed in 1869 at a cost of \$12,820 as part of the Chicago & Northwestern's new rail line from Chicago to the Twin Cities - Minneapolis and St. Paul, Minnesota. The bridge was designed by CN&W's Chief Engineer Van Mienen, and said to be patterned after a Roman stone arch bridge in Compiegne, France which Van Mienen appreciated during his travels in France.
