NYS COUNCIL UPDATE

The NYS Council is comprised of six sections: Buffalo, Hudson-Mohawk, Ithaca, Rochester, Syracuse and MET (NYC Metropolitan). A virtual meeting was held on September 15. Topics discussed include:

- New officers for 2021 will be:
 - Chair: Brad Kubiak Syracuse Section
 - Vice-chair: Tony Cioffi MET Section
 - Treasurer: Doug Castelli MET Section
 - Assistant Treasurer: Tony Cioffi MET Section
 - Secretary: Based on rotations schedule Syracuse Section
- Each year the NYS Council conducts an assessment and collects dues from each Section.
 Discussions are underway to determine if the 2020-2021 assessment will remain the same
 as last year's, reduced, or eliminated in consideration of the impacts of the Covid-19
 pandemic.
- Work on the NYS Report Card had been postponed due to the pandemic, but will resume in early 2021. The current target date for release of the report is midsummer 2022. Volunteers are needed to help develop the report card; those interested can contact <u>Beth</u> Ann Smith.

REGION 1 UPDATE

Region 1 is comprised of all the sections and branches within the states of New Jersey, Connecticut, Rhode Island, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Vermont, New York, and Maine in the US; and individual members in the provinces of New Brunswick, Newfoundland and Labrador, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Quebec in Canada. A virtual assembly meeting was held on September 25. Topics addressed include:

- John Folts will be the new Director, replacing Tony Cioffi as of Oct 2020.
- Like the NYS Council, the Region has their own assessment for dues. A proposal being discussed is a reduction for 2020-2021 to 50% of the 2019-2020 assessment.
- Proposed changes being considered nationally in ASCE membership, subject to approval
 - Graduated dues ladder will be 2 tiered vs. currently 5. All members (except students) 28 and under will pay 50% of standard dues. Other members will pay standard dues.
 - Life members will become eligible after 40 years of membership (vs. 35 now) and will pay 50% of standard dues (vs no dues now).
- Outgoing Society President K.N. Gunalan addressed attendees on the need for ASCE to become more nimble, inclusive, focused and streamlined.
- Incoming Society President Jean Louis Briand outlined his goals focused on communication. He will be conducting these meetings:
 - Town Hall with the President, first business day of the month at noon Central, all members invited. First meeting will be held on Nov. 2.
 - Students Presidential Group, first Sunday of the month at noon Cental, by invitation, guests are welcome by can't speak.
 - Regions Institutes Presidential Group, every other month for 9 Institute Presidents and 10 Region Directors.
- Pilot competitions are being developed for students, including one by the Construction Institute and an entrepreneurial competition (Shark Tank-like).
- Various virtual meeting platforms were discussed. Virtual events are being conducted by
 many sections for meetings, webinars and competitions. Meeting attendance is significantly
 improved on a virtual platform. MS Teams seems to be a popular option. Region 1 is holding
 a Governors meeting to discuss purchasing Zoom software, with potential for shared use by
 sections and branches.
