KENTUCKY SECTION ANNUAL MEETING RECOMMENDATIONS¹

1. Form the Annual Meeting Committee early in the year (January or February) that the Annual Meeting is going to be held. Committee composition should include: Section Vice-President (Committee Chair), host Branch President, a past Section President (this person has organized a previous meeting and has conducted an annual meeting, should be a great resource person), someone responsible for recruiting exhibitors, someone for the registration, plus one or two others to help with the various activities, e.g., meeting location, arrangements at the hotel, and registration table.
2. *The date & location of the meeting should be set as early as possible to insure the time the the desired facilities are available at the desired date.*
Select theme for the Annual Meeting shortly after the formation of the Committee. Theme should be broad-based since we have many different civil engineering practitioners who belong to the Section.
3. Keep the Section President and the Board of Directors informed of the Committee activities. They should be considered as resource people.
4. Send letters of invitation to National officers (particularly the Zone II Vice-President, District 9 Director, and Zone II Member Contact) early in the planning process (around April or May). Addresses for these individuals are given in the ASCE Official Register. The highest ranking ASCE officer to attend the Annual Meeting should be requested to conduct the swearing in ceremony for the new officers. Send a letter to this person at least one month before the Annual Meeting so that they will come prepared.
5. Speakers, program, and meeting location should be finalized by the first of July. Put together a supplement for the Section Newsletter to be included in the August and September Newsletters. Do not forget to send letters of appreciation to the speakers and request information on any audio-visual aids they may require. Send a follow-up letter four to six weeks prior to the Annual Meeting date with all the details on the Annual Meeting. Also, remember to include the fact that they will be guests of the Section at the Evening Banquet, if they wish to stay. Find out their intentions so that an accurate count of the meals can be made.
6. If possible, the host Branch should conduct a luncheon meeting prior to the Afternoon Technical Session. As part of the Annual Meeting program, other ASCE Members should be invited to the luncheon so that they can visit with their colleagues, not be required to make alternative luncheon plans, encourages early arrival so that all the technical sessions are well populated, etc.

¹Recommendations are based on conducting the Annual Meeting in late September.

7. The Section Newsletter is not enough to get Members to the Annual Meeting. Each Branch should be contacted in early September to begin phone solicitation of Members to attend the Annual Meeting.
8. On the Day of the Annual Meeting, someone on the Committee needs to be responsible for interacting with the hotel staff. Unfortunately, something is always not quite perfect, but do not get too upset. The person needs to be calm, if possible.
9. Before the afternoon break, encourage Members to visit the exhibitors. Mention the company names.
10. Do not forget the Section banner.
11. Good luck and add anything else to this list you and Committee believes is necessary for an enjoyable and successful meeting.

AWARDS

SCHOLARSHIP ACTIVITIES

A. Historical Background

The first scholarship program was initiated in 1954 and was the first of its kind amongst ASCE Sections. Awards were made to deserving civil engineering students from the junior classes of the University of Kentucky and the University of Louisville. Eighteen awards were made over the period 1954 through 1961.

In 1961, the scholarship program was changed to an Honor Loan Fund. Loans were made upon application to eight students between 1964 and 1976. Due to a poor record of repayments, students were required to sign a loan form beginning in 1980. Eleven student loans were made between 1980 and 1985.

Due to significant contributions to the Robert M. Gillim Foundation in late 1967 and early 1968, the Board of Trustees of that Foundation initiated a scholarship program. Three scholarships were presented each year from 1968 through 1971 to civil engineering students at the University of Kentucky and the University of Louisville.

During the 1984-85 Section year, a Student Loan Committee, under the direction of Hal Heiner, was formed to evaluate the honor loan program. The efforts of this committee were culminated in an October, 1985 report in which the following recommendations were offered:

- Abolish the student honor loan program.
- Award annual grants to two outstanding students, one each at the UK and UL.
- Establish a standing committee to develop criteria for recipient selection and publicity.
- Solicit additional funds from other groups, businesses and individuals.

B. Scholarship Committee

A Scholarship Committee was formed in September 1986 by Section President Aubrey D. May. Committee membership included:

Dr. Robert C. Deen (Committee Chair)
Mr. Alvin L. Pope (Bluegrass Branch Representative)
Mr. Clarence S. Roehrig, Jr. (Louisville Branch Representative)
Mr. John C. Bridwell (Frankfort Branch Representative)
Dr. David T. Kao (Chair, Dept. of Civil Engineering, University of Kentucky)
Dr. Louis F. Cohn (Chair, Dept. of Civil Engineering, University of Louisville)

The Scholarship Committee charge included:

- Determine the appropriate measures and compile the required data to establish a proper tax status for the scholarship program, assuring no tax liability for the program and preserving deductions for future contributions.
- Assess possible investment vehicles and specific recommendations for the fund such that future scholarships are granted from accrued interest and that some principal amount will be restricted to maintain self-perpetuation.

- Develop recommendations for future fund-raising processes to be undertaken by the Section.
- Offer recommendations as to the initial concentration of efforts, i.e., should all efforts be towards fund raising until some fixed amount is realized, or should relatively small scholarships be administered as the fund grows. It is the wish of the Section that the Scholarship funds provide full semester tuition for each University recipient at some point in the future.
- Formulate criteria for eligibility and selection of each institution recipient.
- Develop Section policy for general administration of the scholarships and the rotation of membership.

A great deal of work and progress towards satisfying the charge provided by Section President Aubrey D. May was accomplished by the Scholarship Committee up to the untimely death of Committee Chair, Dr. Robert C. Deen in March, 1988.

In October 1988, Mr. Alvin L. Pope became Chair of the Scholarship Committee at the request of Section President, Mr. Charles Scroggin. Mr. Pope requested that Dr. George E. Blandford replace Dr. David T. Kao (accepted Dean of Engineering position at Iowa State University) as the Department of Civil Engineering representative from the University of Kentucky. The other initial members remained the same. The Scholarship Committee under the direction of Chair Alvin L. Pope completed its charge given by Section President Aubrey D. May in January, 1989.

C. Capital Campaign Scholarship Committee

The capital campaign activities by the Scholarship Fund Committee began in January 1989. Section President Chuck Wood appointed Bluegrass Branch President George Blandford to Chair a capital campaign fund drive to increase the base Scholarship Fund amount from \$15,000 to \$50,000. This campaign began in the Bluegrass Branch during the late spring of 1989. Initial categories of corporate giving were specified to be: \$2,000 - Corporate Sponsor, \$1,000 - Corporate Contributor; and \$500 - Corporate Friend. Initial categories of individual support were identified as: \$100 - Sponsor and \$25-\$50 - Contributor. The individual categories were later extended to be: \$25-\$80 - Contributor, \$100-\$125 - Sponsor, \$150-\$400 - Super Sponsor, and \$500-\$1,000 - Supreme Sponsor. From the beginnings of the Scholarship Capital Campaign Fund Drive in the Bluegrass Branch, other Branches started similar capital campaign drives. The Louisville Branch, through the Metropolitan Sewer District, held two technical short courses with the proceeds from these short courses being divided evenly between the ASCE and KSPE Scholarship Funds. The Section reached its goal of \$50,000 in 1994 and the fund now stands at nearly \$70,000. This money is currently invested with Hilliard Lyons in stocks, mutual funds, and a money market account.

Recipients of the revised Kentucky Section ASCE Scholarship began in the fall of 1989 and have continued since with one recipient from the University of Kentucky and one from the University of Louisville. A chronological listing of these Scholarship Awardees is listed below:

ASCE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

KENTUCKY SECTION

A. Scholarship Administration Committee

1. The Scholarship Administration Committee shall be composed of the following members¹:

2. The Committee shall report annually to the Kentucky Section. Functions of the Committee are:
 - a. Publicize the Kentucky Section ASCE Scholarship Program and provide the master copy of the application forms to each university. They shall establish a schedule of dates for submittal of applications, judge the applications, and award the scholarships.
 - b. Confirm endorsement of the Student Chapter Advisor and have departmental verification of the qualifying data: class standing, credit hours earned, and not a graduating senior (data to be provided by the respective Civil Engineering Department Chairs).
 - c. Evaluate the applicant's justification for the scholarship².
 - d. Evaluate the applicant's service contributions².
 - e. Select the recipients of the scholarships at the University of Kentucky and the University of Louisville.
 - f. Present the scholarships in a manner that will recognize the recipients, identify the Kentucky Section Scholarship Program as donor of the scholarships, acknowledge the administration of the program by the Kentucky Section ASCE, and publicize the Civil Engineering Profession.
 - g. Send letters to the scholarship recipients in time for recognition at the University's Spring Awards Program and present the scholarship checks at the Kentucky Section ASCE Annual Meeting.
 - h. Retain all applications for at least one year after the award in the spring.

A. Scholarship Fund Committee

1. The Scholarship Fund Committee shall be composed of one member from each of the four Section Branches to serve four-year rotating terms so that one member is replaced each year. The fourth year member will be the Committee Chair. Each Branch will appoint its representative. The Kentucky Section Treasurer will be an ex-officio member of the Committee.
2. The Committee shall report annually to the Kentucky Section. Functions of the Committee are:
 - a. Manage the scholarship fund investments by choosing the funding vehicles and fundraising activities to provide continuing growth of the principal on deposit.
 - b. Fundraising Activities: Activities each year will be determined by the Committee. The following activities should be considered:
 - (1) Direct solicitations from corporations, through Branch committee members who are individuals with "influence and clout" such as firm principals or individuals holding high level positions in other agencies.
 - (2) Kentucky Section Newsletter articles to encourage individual and corporate donations or deferred giving through wills.
 - (3) Voluntary line item with the Kentucky Section membership dues statement.
 - (4) Encourage Branch participation by direct contributions or by designating surplus budget funds.
 - (5) Encourage student participation in building the Scholarship Fund.
- a. Establish the amount of the scholarship on a yearly basis. Funds are restricted to the accrued interest from the investments.
