The weather outside was anything but springlike both temperature-wise and dreary, but our healthy turnout was there to participate in three interesting breakout topics once the formalities and dinner were enjoyed.

President Kevin Brown opened the event and reminded the crowd he was presiding over his last dinner meeting (and as many of us, he found it hard to believe as well). After a few announcements, he welcomed the representatives of the featured Student Chapters in alphabetical order, with Swarthmore College, which was within sight of the venue, first up, offering Student Chapter President Ben Aaron and Vice President Elijah Dillow for its presentation. Villanova University Student Chapter co-presidents Jordyn DiGiaimo and Joseph Armstrong brought all up to speed on its recent activities. Science Fairs – Projects Reviewed, Winners Selected

Our Section once again participated in the Delaware Valley Science Fairs this year. Our Special Awards are available for student projects that involve or touch on civil engineering topics and concepts, and we have managed to find and highlight a number of interesting and commendable efforts over the years. We have consistently found in our over 30 years of being part of the Fairs and offering our Special Awards that evaluating and picking the top projects is consistently a difficult task given the quality and interesting subject matter of the offerings. It was not made any easier this year with a record number of participants (close to 1000 students).

The plural in the Science Fairs title is not a typo, as the event is a compilation of 13 separate science fairs/events across a fairly large geographic area, stretching to the Jersey Shore, all of Delaware, and the Lehigh Valley, bringing students whose projects have won school district and local contests to compete on a regional level. The top medal winners at the Fairs can move on to the International Science and Engineering Fair later this spring.

Our judging "contingent" included six volunteers this time, with four of the judges having done this Continued on page 7

SEPTA RE-DESIGNATES SOME BUS AND RAIL TRANSIT ROUTES, AND HOPEFULLY CONFUSION DOES NOT RESULT...

In mid-February, SEPTA completed the rebranding process for several bus routes and all of its rail transit services. Until that point some bus routes had letter designations, with seven of these holding on until six of them were changed to numbers. When the Philadelphia Rapid Transit Company added bus services to its already extensive system of streetcar routes and the Market-Frankford El (and bus operation has been around for 100 years this year, the first routes starting in 1925), it gave the new routes letter designations to set them apart from the streetcar lines which had route numbers. This was additionally a key delineator as the fare to ride a bus was slightly higher (10 cents) than the 7½ cents one was charged to ride a trolley (8 cents cash fare, two tokens for 15 cents). As the bus network grew, with 26 letters, possibilities soon ran out, and new route designations such as C-1, D-1, H-1, R-1, Wa, XA, XB, XH and XO were used, in addition to numbers 83 and above as the letters were getting exhausted (and the system had a Route O but did not use I).

Conversion of trolley routes to buses after World War II and similar route consolidations

muddied up this division and a system with mostly bus routes which evolved in the late 1950's merely carried the legacy designations forward. Over time since then, letters have been phased out as route restructurings occurred. One issue

Longtime Section Member and Life Member Eric Flicker passed away peacefully on March 31 in Savannah, GA, where he had relocated several years ago following his retirement.

Eric earned his bachelor's degree in Civil Engineering from Lehigh University along with his subsequent MBA. His professional career started at Spotts, Stevens, and McCoy in Reading in 1968 where he rose through the ranks and eventually became President. After several years locally at Woodward Clyde, he joined Pennoni, where he served as the Chief Financial Officer for 10 years and then moved into a Senior Consultant role prior to his retirement.

Eric's career was rewarding and his impact vast as a Civil Engineer with extensive background in developing municipal infrastructure projects, his service to the American Council of Engineering Companies (ACEC) family serving as a national Chairman, and in Pennsylvania. He was additionally an active member of the Engineers' Club of Philadelphia, where he served as Club President in 2008-09, as well as our Section. He received our Section's Civil Engineer of the Year award in 2006 after having been cited as the Delaware Valley Engineer of the Year earlier that same year. He was active in several community service organizations including Habitat for Humanity, Philadelphia Education Fund, Public Citizens for Children and Youth, and Philadelphia Scholars, and helped to lead local Math Counts efforts.

An avid sports fan, Eric enjoyed Phantasy camp with the Phillies and was in the stadium when the Phils won both World Series titles in 1980 and 2008. He also closely followed the Eagles and was an avid golfer, but unfortunately never had a hole in one.

Eric is survived by his wife Gerry Ann, two sons, two stepdaughters, six grandchildren and seven greatgrandchildren. A celebration of his life was conducted on April 12.

became apparent when two-way radios began to be used on transit vehicles in the mid-1980's and the lettered routes had to be given internal number references to be able to use the radio network, as only numbers were able to be used and displayed on the radio receivers.

When the letters finally went away, the last seven were G, H, J, K, L, R and XH, which morphed into 63, 71, 41, K, 51, 82 and 81 respectively, filling in gaps in the current number scheme. Route K will remain as the lone holdout until an anticipated route revision is put into effect in the next year or so. The destination signs on the buses will show both letter and number pulsing between the two for a transition period yet to be determined to help riders acclimate to this change.

On the rail transit side, the Market-Frankford Line becomes the L (makes sense, as most Philadelphians call this the El already), the Broad Street Line is now the B (with B1 local, B2 express and B3 Ridge Spur), and the Norristown High-Speed Line (once known as Route 100) is changing to the M. Trolley routes have new designations – 10 to T1, 11 to T4, 13 to T3, 34 to T2 and 36 to T5 for the subway-surface lines, 15 to G, 101 to D1 and 102 to D2.

Regional Rail remains as it has been with names of lines as the designations. You may recall a time not that long ago when these were R routes, and despite continued existence of references to *Continued on page 6*

them on occasional signs and in the minds of many, it may be hard to believe that the R designations have been gone for nearly 15 years. Despite that, many riders still call them by their former R numbers. One of our Section's Life Members, Dr. Vukan Vuchic, developed the R system for the opening of the Center City Commuter Connection in 1984 (41 years ago...!) as trains which previously terminated or started in Center City were now able to run through the Tunnel and to new outlying endpoints. The R numbers helped to simplify the new through operation (as opposed to all routes terminating and starting at Reading Terminal or Suburban Station) for users.

If you remember the R numbers, you may have been around for the ill-fated renaming of the Subway and El as the Orange and Blue lines (along with the subway-surface cars as the Green Lines). This somewhat mimicked the very successful rebranding of Boston's rapid transit system in the mid-1960's that remains today. It never quite caught on locally.

Just in case you were wondering where that ${\sf G}$ bus went and why it's now a streetcar...

for many years. The group, led by Past Section President Chris Rood, included Past Presidents Ruben David, Chris Menna, Briana Pampuch and Bob Wright, and Sharon **Dotts**. The judges evaluated roughly 25 engineering-related projects to develop a



short list of candidates to interview for our Section's Special Awards, which recognize a first and second place finisher in individual projects in the Grades 6-8 and Grades 9-12 categories.

Despite the projects being classified into various science disciplines, including engineering, our judges often find that they must review many projects in other areas such as physics, earth sciences, environmental sciences, and mathematics that may touch on the nature of civil engineering. Sometimes these projects cross different disciplines, and sometimes they are merely misclassified. Thus, this evaluation and review involves a bit of "legwork" and searching among the many project displays, often with at least glance at each of the individual (non-team) offerings to develop their candidate short-lists.

After considerable review and discussion, our team sorted through and short-listed several projects and came up with two winners in each of the categories of Grades 6-8 and Grades 9-12. The winning students and their projects were:

Grades 9-12 1st place
