NEWS FROM NATIONAL

New President Elect and National Directors/ Governors

This year's election for National President Elect, Region Governors Elect, and several constitutional amendments was concluded on June 1. MARIA LEHMAN, Director of US Infrastructure at GHD, and longtime ASCE member and volunteer, was the victor in the election for President Elect, going up against PETER MOORE. Ms. Lehman has been extremely active in National ASCE as well as her "home" Section in Buffalo.

Ms. Lehman will be inducted at the Annual Business Meeting this fall at the ASCE 2021 Convention (more information on this is provided below). Her detailed biography and experience are provided on ASCE National's website.

In addition, several Regional Directors and Governors were elected in this process. For our Region (Region 2), Patrick Sullivan of the Pittsburgh Section will be installed as our Governor-Elect.

By a vote of 66.5% in favor, the membership also defeated the proposed constitutional amendment intended to allow Student Members the right to vote. Amendments to the constitution require the affirmative vote of two-thirds (2/3) of those members voting, thus although the measure obtained a majority of votes, it was "thisclose" to not getting the required percentage to pass.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT REQUIREMENTS UPDATE

With this having been in place for at least a decade or so, you likely know the "drill" – professional engineers, land surveyors and geologists in most states are required to obtain continued professional development (CPD) credit to be able to renew their licenses. This is PA's "year" for renewals for PE's as current licenses expire on September 30. And this being summertime, it might be difficult for you if you need to get some professional development hours (PDH's) you'll need to have to renew if you already don't have them in hand.

Our Section's meeting program is generally able to count toward your continuing education requirement (meetings that the Section believes would not count will be prefaced as such in the meeting announcement) for many states. We also offer various Technical Group and YMF meetings and events that offer PDH credit. We continue to have a verification program in place to help our members obtain and track PDH's. Over a two-year licensure period, our Section meeting program alone could amount to half of what one needs to meet many states' requirements. Also, starting last season, we have a library of recorded meetings that you will be able to view and obtain PDH's through Teachable.com. Please see our website for more information

on this.

If you haven't taken full advantage of what our Section offers, the reality is that we have little to no Section activity over the summer, so you may need to pick up those PDH's in another way. Fortunately ASCE National offers free on-demand webinars and coursework that will get you up to 10 PDH's as a benefit of your membership. Information on this is available in the Membership section of the ASCE National website (www.asce.org). There are other offerings that are available from National at cost to help you pick up what you may need as well.

If you don't yet have the letters PE after your name and are thinking about going for it, please check ASCE's live exam review courses. This allows one to interact with instructors during live webinars and access free on-demand recordings 24/7 until the exam date. The courses reference codes specified by NCEES for the exam. You can feel confident with the most comprehensive and convenient way to prepare for and pass the exam. More information is available on the ASCE National website.

FROM THE SOMEWHAT CLUTTERED DESK OF THE EDITOR...

We're at that point in the summer when it starts to feel like "forever" since we've had an ASCE meeting (and in actuality, it was only about 2 months ago when we conducted the Spring Social and wrapped up the 2020-21 season, way back in mid-May). Now that summer is here, the days are longer (actually, they've already started getting shorter, once we passed the first day of summer late last month), the weather is warmer, and, not related to the season, the restrictions that we've had on social distancing, gatherings, etc., are starting to go by the wayside. The good news is that we took on the virus and in many ways won, but we know the virus is a little tricky and we need to be vigilant and keep an eye on the mutations, reoccurrences, etc.

I find myself back at my "real" desk and since I have been regularly occupying it it's managing to get a little cluttered again. I had been keeping it fairly clean, but by the same token that was only because I was working from home and cluttering the desk there. Now that we have returned to the office, the home desk is looking very neat and clean. Go figure.

As we know, wrapping up the 2020-21 season seemed a little different, as it was indeed a different season – no in-person meetings, no networking, plenty of virtual offerings and gettogethers, but we managed to conduct a very successful meeting season despite never seeing Past President Jen Reigle in person presiding over any of them or having any of those tasty (and very much missed) dinners at Maggiano's. We all are looking forward to returning to normal (if we, at this point, remember what that exactly is keep in mind we did manage to squeeze in our last meeting in March 2020 as the world was closing down and all of us were treading very carefully forward, not quite fully aware of what was coming our way). If you're counting (and my firm's president has given us numbered weekly updates, so I know this), we're in the 60's at this point - and you may recall how at first we were thinking maybe 4-6 weeks of guarantine would do the trick.

We have come out of an economic disaster with jobs available and begging for applicants (maybe not so great, but better news than we faced at the start of the pandemic), and most if not all of us have remained very busy and gainfully employed in our field.

The "experiment" of virtual meetings, into which we tread very carefully in May 2020, turned out to be a new and useful tool that has been greatly accepted and embraced by our members. As previously noted, we managed to conduct EVERY event last season virtually, and we had great topics and very respectable participation, so we were able to continue to serve our membership. Keep in mind the response of many of our peer groups was merely to cancel and shut down programs for the duration - we didn't feel we could do that, given the technology available to us, but we knew there was going to be a "learning curve" of sorts to figure out how to use the methods that could make this happen, have them be able to accommodate large groups of attendees, and make them run effectively. We found a good and dedicated corps of folks who took this on and made the meetings happen, and we appreciate their assistance very much. We knew our members were depending on us (no pressure...). While they would come without the usual networking/happy hour and meal that gave our meetings a nice social touch, we wandered into the "strange and different land" of virtual meetings, and succeeded on several fronts delivering a quality program and meaningful/ informative meetings, meeting the expectations of our members, and having good turnout and participation. We showed that we could indeed do this, and this gave us an option in our "arsenal" in the event that we would need to use it again. We were not about to merely give up and blame it on the situation beyond our control - we were proactive and did what we could do.

And, as we have found, we may have done "too good", if that's possible. Getting to meetings became quite a bit easier for many, with no need to factor in travel, scheduling, etc., and now we may need to look at a situation in which even our in-person meetings may need to be "hybrid" of sorts, to accommodate both those wanting to attend physically as well as those who may prefer to be there virtually. We will need to play this by ear as our season starts up.

We continue to do very well and are both admired and envied by other groups which can only wonder how we do it. Our good mix of seasoned leaders, the enthusiasm of our Younger Members Forum, and the active and strong Student Sections, makes it all work. We consistently have good meetings and topics and get good turnouts at our events, something other groups struggle to do. We manage to succeed, despite how busy we all are, because we make it work. Our "good thing", which you've often heard me call this, is entering into its 109th year of existence this season. Our collective strength lies in the people who take advantage of what our Section has to offer. We have been successful lately in our outreach efforts to "spread the word" about what we do, particularly with students, and we will be continuing to do so.

We also have the advantage and "depth" of experience, as you may have seen with the good involvement and turnout of Past Presidents and officers/directors in our events and committees. A number of folks remain strong supporters of what we do, thus we can easily continue to be a "good thing" for many years to come. We hope to see you during our coming season's events, and if you have time to offer help, please let us know.
