MARCH SECTION JOINT MEETING

March 13, 2025

Maggiano's Center City

Delaware River Port Authority (DRPA) Capital Program and Projects Update

For our fourth and last Section meeting at Maggiano's for this season, we managed to pick a typical March day weather-wise, with the advantage of the extended daylight which started earlier that week, to schedule our somewhat-regular update from the Delaware River Port Authority (DRPA). While we had planned to have three meetings at Maggiano's at the outset of the season, the "surprise" lunchtime meeting in late January added another opportunity for us to gather there and enjoy the fine offerings. The combination of the topic and the expected large quantities of Italian goodies no doubt enticed a full room of nearly 100 attendees to partake at our next-to-last dinner meeting of the season (hard to believe, but we know time flies). As well, after two meetings fairly closely spaced (within two weeks) in January, many were pleased to see friends and colleagues after over a month and a half with no ASCE events.

President Kevin Brown corralled folks from their networking and chats to get the evening underway. As the first course of dinner started, he made several announcements on upcoming happenings and events. He wound things up and brought the representatives of the featured Student Chapter for the evening, Temple University, to the podium. Matt Hendrickson, Chapter President, and Morgan Birney, Chapter Vice President, gave a short update on current activities in the Chapter.

Shortly after the arrival of the second course of dinner, President Elect Jesse Gormley took the podium to introduce the evening's speaker, Michael Venuto, DRPA Chief Engineer. Mr. Venuto gave a short background and introduction of DRPA's functions and responsibilities on the PATCO rapid transit line and its four Delaware River crossings, the oldest of which, the Ben Franklin Bridge, will have a celebration event for its 100th anniversary in 2026. He presented the Authority's planned 2025-29 Capital Program, with a total value of just over \$800 million, and noted that the focus of the funds was primarily facility upgrades and system preservation.

In particular, the Commodore Barry and Betsy Ross Bridges, each of which has been in service for roughly 50 years, being the "youngsters" of the Authority's structures, were in need of overhaul and restoration work. The Barry Bridge in particular has the Authority's largest project to date with work now underway for complete structural painting, deck repairs and resurfacing, and related work. This will no doubt result in traffic backups as lanes will need to be closed to facilitate the work, even with work restrictions to nights and weekends to minimize the traffic impacts (although with summer shore traffic, backups will be a reality).

With last year's ship strike event at the Key Bridge in Maryland, Mr. Venuto related the concerns and press inquiries about how the Authority's bridges are protected from such a mishap. It was able to respond well as it had installed rock islands and dolphins around bridge supports in the river at some locations several years ago and will continue to assess the vulnerability of some of these supports where necessary. With larger ships traversing the Delaware River as a result of the channel deepening effort several years ago this remains a concern.

Mr. Venuto reported that PATCO, which celebrated 55 years of service last year, has been targeted for facility upgrades and modernization. In many cases this work will address components and items that date to the original construction of the line in the 1960's and have reached the end of their expected service lives. This includes the original "Bridge Line" segment in Philadelphia and Camden, the oldest portions of which have been in use since the mid-1930's. Additionally, ADA access improvements have been enhanced and elevators have been provided at a number of stations along with related power and infrastructure improvements and escalator replacements. Extensive work, with a price tag of \$30 million, has recently been completed to permit the reopening of the Franklin Square Station, planned to happen this spring after being closed in the late 1970's.

A few questions were posed to Mr. Venuto and he ably responded to them. President-Elect Gormley closed the evening and thanked Mr. Venuto for a job well done with his always welcome and informative presentation and provided him with the Section's speaker gift for his effort.

One thing we have changed, however, was that we give the President a chance for rebuttal by doing this in April. Before your current Editor's occupancy of this position, *THE NEWS* closed its season with a combined April-May edition. Thus, assessing the President's accomplishments was the final word as far as any reporting on this as well as any chance for objections from the standing President. (And maybe there was a method to that madness...) Thus, we are just a little more kind with our addition of a May issue and allowing the now-penultimate one (April) to provide this "roast" thus giving the President a chance for response in May. (Your word for today, penultimate...) Thus, with that background firmly established, let's get into the details.

Now that you've invested four paragraphs and a few minutes in this, some specifics are in order, as it took a while to get here and you may have forgotten why you started down this rabbit hole... Our Section has had the pleasure of having **Kevin Brown** as our leader and President for this season, the 112th President we've had in our history. Kevin clearly has many more hours in his day than the rest of us given his many volunteer undertakings and efforts in addition to his busy "day job", but he's not letting on about how many hours or his secrets in being able to balance all of what he does. I met Kevin likely well before many of you did, upon his arrival at Urban Engineers in the 2008-09 timeframe to work as a co-op student. It was good to see his enthusiasm and willingness to volunteer and I thought maybe some of this rubbed off from me onto Kevin, but... Kevin admitted in one of his President's messages that, while he was not all that involved in the ASCE Student Chapter at Widener, the Canstruction effort kind of led him into YMF and he went back to Widener after graduation to help mentor and speak to students about society involvement. He will tell you he wasn't sure he would be going to college in his youth and managed to get the engineering "bug" once he arrived in high school while still not sure he would be going to college.

Over the years we would run into each other at various functions and meetings and I was able to observe Kevin's growth as a professional. While he still remained basically quiet and unassuming, more of that dry sense of humor he has was becoming evident (another similarity between us... this was getting a little scary between this and his getting into more volunteer work, maybe something else that somehow rubbed off, but maybe that's a good thing...). He soon added teaching to his growing resume as he landed some adjunct work at the College of New Jersey as well as coursework at Widener, in pursuit of his Master's degree.

Kevin continued his involvement in YMF as well as the Engineers' Club with attempts to get a younger member group established there, again putting those extra hours and days he seems to have to good use. Hence the title of this piece, since he seems to have been a Younger Member longer than he should have... (and we at *THE NEWS* are not looking to check ID's or anything like that...). On the employment side he left Urban, then returned, only to leave Urban again to arrive at TranSystems, where he has found fame and fortune (?). And he also began to rise out of the YMF and into the Section proper in several capacities, going through the Section Board ranks and soon landing in the presidential succession.

His well-thought-out and well-written President's messages this season have chronicled Kevin's recent activities and work. MEMBERS IN THE NEWS

Brown, Falcone Honored by PSPE Delco

The Delaware County Chapter of the Pennsylvania Society of Professional Engineers (PSPE) conducted its annual Engineers Week Dinner on February 20. Two of our Section members were honored at that event.

Vicki Brown, Professor Emerita of Civil Engineering at Widener University, was cited as the Chapter's **2025 Engineer of the Year**. The award is given each year to a candidate who resides or is employed in Delaware County or southern Chester County, and is evaluated against a rigorous criterion including professional achievement and contributions to community. This award is among the many accolades that Vicki has earned throughout her career for her academic, scholarship, and community engagement work. She earned emerita status in December after service more than 40 years in Widener's Civil Engineering department.




