JANUARY SECTION JOINT MEETING

January 21, 2026

Crowne Plaza, Hotel, King of Prussia

Pottstown Bypass Reconstruction Program (SR 422 Sections M01, M02, M03)

Our first meeting of the 2026 half of the current season was a bit late in January and much like an expected January day, cold and cloudy. And, as has been the case for over 35 years, January on our Section calendar means a joint meeting with our colleagues and friends at the **Delaware Valley Section of the American Society of Highway Engineers (ASHE)**. This also means an "away game" for our members, as ASHE hosts this event at its meeting spot at the Crowne Plaza in King of Prussia. And, as it tends to be, it was a popular meeting, with over 170 participants showing up to

hear about the reconstruction program of US 422 in the Pottstown area. **ASHE Section President Kevin Rice** opened the meeting, once all were settled, with a warm welcome and several announcements, and handed things off to **President Jesse Gormley** for our Section's updates. Past President (of each Section...) **Bob Wright** was brought to front and center to both offer a blessing of the meal as well as a short tribute to Section Past President **Joe Syrnick** (please see Joe's obituary elsewhere in this edition).

As dinner wound down, ASHE Section President Rice returned to the podium to start the featured presentation. PennDOT Assistant District Construction Engineer **Sal Ali** opened the session with a general overview of the program, which began design in 2008 and has advanced through the development phase as three sections, expanding to seven sections for construction. He was assisted by members of the design and construction team from Jacobs, the project consultant, who each presented on different aspects of the work and current progress. Four of the seven construction sections are in active construction at present, with the remaining three sections planned for lettings over the next three years. The combined efforts under this program have a construction value of over \$260 million to date. The work will address bridges that are in need of replacement and rehabilitation as they are at or near the ends of their service lives, roadway reconstruction to improve substandard highway curvature, geometry and guide rail/barriers, and related work, including the expansion of ITS capability to allow PennDOT to better monitor traffic from its King of Prussia control center. Each of the project team leaders explained aspects of the work in detail and showed progress photos of the work, including a flyover video (but not including a blasting video, which, for whatever reason, could not be made to work).

The project team, shown from left to right in the photo below, includes **Dilip Radadia** (Jacobs, Project Manager), **Chris Naab** (Jacobs, Structural Project Engineer), **Sal Ali** (PennDOT), and **Tom Cornell** (Jacobs, Highway Group Manager).

Several questions were posed by the audience, to which the presentation team ably responded.

President Rice wrapped up the evening with thanks to the team for its good work, offering them speaker's gifts of appreciation for their efforts.

Multimodal Bridges: Any bridge designed for bike and pedestrian use only


On the Job: Under construction, during an inspection

VOGUE MAGAZINE NAMES POPE LEO XIV AS ONE OF THE BEST DRESSED PEOPLE OF 2025

We at *THE NEWS* do our best to avoid coverage and/or inclusion of certain topics, especially those which will, despite any attempt to remain unbiased and fair, have the possibility of wandering into the swamp of controversy (thus, politics and religion are two) and in which we have little or no knowledge to sufficiently form an objective viewpoint (with your Editor being an Engineer for over two generations (and you can do the math...), you will not be surprised that fashion and wardrobe fall into this area). Then again, most of our loyal readers (the tens of them...) know that we tend to not be strict rule-followers either, still looking to be that rebel with no cause... and with no knowledge why.

Thus, we venture into said swamp on a topic that encompasses religion and fashion and offer this for your edification and enjoyment. As noted and qualified, we have next to no fashion sense (we know this because we have been told this, and we are not insulted by that comment, because we know it to be very true), so there is not much we can add with any authority. On the topic of religion, we can firmly state we have lots of knowledge on it, but most of it in a single denomination.

Since being elected in May 2025, Pope Leo XIV has made headlines for raising the alarm on climate change, appearing on priest-led DJ sets, and being a proud White Sox fan. Now, he's gaining recognition for something even more unexpected, his personal style. The Pope was

named one of the **55 Best Dressed People of 2025** by *Vogue* magazine, a unique recognition for the leader of the Catholic Church.

Despite the limited outfit options the Pope has, he has given his attire a personal touch. *Vogue* points out that Pope Leo XIV has become known for "breaking with the humble tastes of his predecessor, Pope Francis, but keeping his tailor and maintaining the papal legacy for fine-fitting liturgical vestments." They also note that by inviting Monica Bellucci and Cate Blanchett to the Vatican, he has tried his best to modernize the church's image.

Vogue named what Pope Leo XIV wore on his first appearance as Pope, on the central loggia of St. Peter's Basilica, as his best outfit of the year. He stepped out wearing a red satin mozzetta cape and wine-red, gold-embroidered stole paired with a cross pendant on a gold silk cord. Beyond these details, it's his unexpected accessories that have caught the eye of fashion enthusiasts and experts alike. When the new Pope donned a White Sox hat with his papal robes, or when filmmaker Spike Lee presented him a Knicks jersey as the team boasted three players from the Pope's alma mater, Villanova University, these are the moments that allow him to stand out.

The Pope's robes are also made by Italian designer and tailor Filippo Sorsinelli at atelier LAVS in Santarcangelo di Romagna in Rimini. Sorsinelli

grew up in a family of weavers and seamstresses, and has a background in sacred art and historical weaving. At 50, he has dressed the last three Popes, including Leo XIV, a natural choice given their shared history. "I've known Pope Leo XIV for 30 years," Sorsinelli told *Le Monde*. "We first met in 1995 in the city of Tolentino, not far from my hometown. At the time, I was playing organ in churches and he was an Augustinian friar in the region."

Other personalities on the Best Dressed list are former First Lady Michelle Obama, singer Bad Bunny, actor Jeremy Strong, and basketball star Shai Gilgeous-Alexander. While most of the people listed can flaunt their styles often on red carpets, fashion lovers may have to settle with only catching a glimpse of the Pope's OOTD (outfit of the day) during Mass or when he's riding around in the Popemobile.

[And, since we fully understand and believe the concept of papal infallibility, and know the Pope is very close to the "Big Guy", we will not disagree with this assessment. We are fairly certain there are a few other little-known papal fiascos out there that cover this situation as well, and since they are usually in Latin it would be easy enough to "loosely" interpret the intent – Ed., as you know, a product of our Catholic schools and an altar boy. Also, for those of you not of the One True Church, please know that papal fiascos are not what the Pope drives (he does not drive, but is transported in the famous Popemobile...)]

SECTION AWARDS — NOMINATIONS OPEN

As we typically do this time of year, we are opening our Section's 2026 Awards Program for nominations. These allow us to recognize Section members and others for their contributions to the Civil Engineering profession. All awards will be presented at the Spring Social, scheduled for May 14.

We encourage you to submit nominations for those deserving individuals who should be recognized for their various contributions, achievements, and career milestones, appropriately.

We have a slightly different approach this year, with the nomination form being available via Google form. Please view the Awards criteria on the **Awards** page of our website for your use. Please download the **Google nomination form** for submission of your nomination(s) and supporting information/package.

GUIDELINES/RULES

Nominations must be received by 5:00 PM on Friday, February 27. Nominations should be submitted on the Google form.

Individuals may be nominated for awards by a member in any grade of membership. Nominators are NOT required to be members of the Philadelphia Section but must be ASCE members in good standing.

Individuals may receive only one award in a single year, but may be nominated for more than one award in a single year.

Award recipients are subject to the approval of our Section's Board of Directors.

Awards are presented only during years in which, in the judgement of the Awards Committee or the Board, there is at least one suitable candidate.

The Awards Committee, at its discretion, may nominate a candidate or an alternate for each award for Board consideration.

The Awards Committee will recommend to the Board whether the recipient should also be nominated for applicable National or Regional awards by our Section.

A nominee for an award MUST be a member in good standing of the Philadelphia Section in the

year in which the nomination is made, with three exceptions - for Educator of the Year, Government Service Award, and Philadelphia History and Heritage Award, nominees need not be members of ASCE and/or the Philadelphia Section.

The Section has a total of 14 awards which cover various specialty areas. In addition, the Section President can nominate an individual for the Presidential Award at his/her discretion. All award descriptions can be found on our website (noted above).

Joseph R. Syrnick



We are sad to report the passing of Joe Syrnick on January 17. Joe leaves behind a legacy marked by his professional talents, devout faith, and loving family.

Joe is certainly a legend and leaves a legacy in our Section, where he was very active and held

several different positions including Section President (1980-81) and National District Director in the mid-1980's, as well as a frequent presenter for his many projects. His "paying" job was his distinguished 34-year career with the Philadelphia Streets Department, where he ultimately rose to the role of Chief Engineer and Surveyor, a position he held for 18 years. Following his retirement from the City, he entered his second career as the President and Chief Executive Officer for the Schuylkill River Development Corporation (SRDC). He directed SRDC, also known as Schuylkill Banks, for the past 20 years, leading the mission to revitalize the lower Schuylkill River corridor. His work with SRDC was motivated by his strong desire to bring access to Philadelphia's "hidden river" for all to enjoy. While his primary role involved the advocating for trail development or advancing capital projects, you could also find him on the Banks setting up movie nights, helping kayakers off the docks, and narrating riverboat tours where he enthusiastically shared the rich history of the tidal Schuylkill.

Joe served in numerous capacities within his professional and local communities. He served as the President of the Department of Streets' Board of Surveyors, as a Commissioner of Fairmount Park, and as a member of Philadelphia's City Planning Commission, rising to position of Vice Chairman. In addition to our Section and ASCE he was also active with the Engineers' Club of Philadelphia, and other local Engineering organizations. He was honored with many awards over the course of his career, including being named as the Delaware Valley Engineer of the Year in 1997, but he especially cherished the honor bestowed on him by Drexel University in 2024 when he received an Honorary Doctorate for his visionary leadership in engaging diverse civic partners to revive the promise of a waterfront jewel in Philadelphia. He was a proud Drexel alum, obtaining his Bachelor's degree in civil engineering in 1969 and a Master's degree the following year. He would proudly tell you he was in the last graduating class from the Drexel Institute of Technology before its transformation into University status.

Joe shared 55 years of marriage with his beloved wife, Mary Beth. His family includes his three daughters and seven grandchildren. His most important role was that as a husband and father. When his girls were young, he could be found building massive sandcastles on the beach, behind the plate umpiring softball games, helping with homework, and on the sidelines of sporting events and dance recitals cheering them on.

Memorial donations can be made in Joe's name to the Basilica Shrine of Our Lady of the Miraculous Medal or Holy Family Church, his parish, in Manayunk.


