NATIONAL ASCE IN THE NEWS

Nominee for Society President-Elect Named

Rossana D'Antonio, P.E., G.E., ENV SP, F.ASCE, will be the official nominee for ASCE president-elect on the 2026 Society election ballot this spring, as approved by the Board of



Direction Nominating Committee. ASCE will induct the election winner as the 2027 president-elect this fall at the annual business meeting. They would then assume the role of Society president for 2028.

D'Antonio serves as the executive director of NV5, a global consulting firm. Before that, she worked for Los Angeles County Public Works in a variety of roles over the span of a 33-year career there, including as deputy director of municipal services and emergency management from 2016 to 2023.

At ASCE, she served on the Board of Direction as an at-large director, 2022-25, has been active in many other Society activities, from advocacy to sustainability over the years, and has been a long-time leader in Region 9, California, and her hometown of Los Angeles.

D'Antonio's vision for ASCE is rooted in service, resilience, and humanity: "I see ASCE leading the charge in digital transformation," she writes in her vision statement. "I want our members to be equipped with the tools and insights to thrive in a data-driven world. That means embracing technology, yes – but also embracing curiosity, adaptability, and lifelong learning."

SO, VIDEO GAMES DO HAVE A REAL-WORLD/USEFUL PURPOSE...

You may have heard your teenager (or younger) tell you this when you casually ask if he/she intends to make a career of video game playing. Well, maybe there's something to that...

Mario Kart is one of the world's most popular video game series. For decades, players have spent countless hours steering Super Mario characters through chaotic races on twisting tracks, dodging obstacles while attempting to sabotage their fellow drivers. So, when researchers were looking for an accurate simulation of real-world road conditions that they could use to train autonomous driving systems, Mario Kart seemed like the perfect fit.

Enter the **University of Maryland**, where researchers, funded by the **US Naval Air Warfare Center Aircraft Division**, are putting that logic to the test by training artificial intelligence to "play" Mario Kart on its own, letting software run laps in a virtual world before it ever encounters a real one. "We're actually using these automated driving systems to figure out how to verify that the systems are correct and then make sure that they adhere to the rules

of the road," Mumu Xu, an associate professor of aerospace engineering, explained to *WTOP News* in October.

In this setup, the AI is trained to safely complete laps in the original 1992 Mario Kart game, and based on how well it avoids speeding, collisions and general vehicular mayhem, the system assigns a safety score that determines whether it must go back to driving school or advance to the next level. "We can say to the designers, go back and train your car again to make sure that it doesn't violate certain rules," Xu said. The research is still in its early stages, but Mario's popularity makes him a convenient guinea pig. As Xu put it, "Using Mario is a way for us to work in simulation, to first test whether or not something is useful."

Whether this says more about artificial intelligence or the daily driving experience many of us face in the "real world" remains an open question.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT REQUIREMENTS UPDATE

As those who hold professional licensure in Engineering, Surveying, and Geology know (among others), Continued Professional Development (CPD) credit must be obtained as a requirement for license renewal. While PA PE's are just starting a new licensing rotation (having renewed at the end of last September), those of you who hold PE licenses in neighboring states, particularly NJ and DE, will be needing to renew your licensure this spring (April for NJ, June for DE). Thus, it may be a good time to assess what you might need credit-wise to be able to attest to this for your license renewal.

Our Section's meeting program is generally able to count toward your continuing education requirement (meetings that the Section believes would not count will be prefaced as such in the meeting announcement) for many states. We also offer various Technical Group and YMF meetings and events that offer PDH credit. We continue to have a verification program in place to help our members obtain and track PDH's. Over a two-year licensure period, our Section meeting program

alone could amount to half of what one needs to meet many states' requirements.

If you haven't taken full advantage of what our Section offers, you may need to pick up those PDH's in another way. Fortunately ASCE National offers free on-demand webinars and coursework that will get you up to 10 PDH's as a benefit of your membership. Information on this is available in the Membership section of the ASCE National website (www.asce.org). There are other offerings that are available from National at cost to help you obtain what you may need as well.

If you don't yet have the letters PE after your name and are thinking about going for it, please check ASCE's live exam review courses. This allows one to interact with instructors during live webinars and access free on-demand recordings 24/7 until the exam date. The courses reference codes specified by NCEES for the exam. You can feel confident with the most comprehensive and convenient way to prepare for and pass the exam. More information is available on the ASCE National website.

a reduced price.

The Flat Rock Dam and the associated Manayunk Canal were constructed in 1819 as part of the commercial navigation system operated by the Schuylkill Navigation Company along the Schuylkill River. When navigation operations ceased in 1947, the canal intake was bulkheaded, disconnecting the canal from the river. In the decades that followed, the canal relied primarily on stormwater outfalls from the Roxborough and Manayunk communities, resulting in stagnant conditions and significant ecological degradation.

In the early 2000s, the Philadelphia Water Department, in partnership with Philadelphia Parks & Recreation, initiated a project to stabilize the Flat Rock Dam intake and restore flow to the canal. This effort required innovative engineering, careful historic preservation, ecosystem restoration, and the coordination of alternative funding sources. After nearly two decades of planning, design, and permitting, the project was bid in 2021 at a cost of \$16 million, with construction completed and flow successfully restored to the Manayunk Canal in the summer of 2025.
