Nashville Branch Report

Recent Activities:

West Tennessee Branch Report

The West Tennessee Branch Board met July 14th, August 11th and September 8th to discuss Branch business. Branch meetings were not held in July and August as the Branch does not typically host summer meetings. Mayor Jim Strickland spoke at the annual Kickoff Meeting on September 21st and discussed development in the Memphis area. Three life members, Wade Towles' (in memoriam), Kenneth Markwell and Richard Sweigard, were inducted and the new branch leadership was installed during the kickoff meeting. Engineering presentations were hosted monthly in Jackson, TN.

The 25th Annual ASCE West TN Branch Golf Tournament was held on June 21st and \$2,300 was raised for the student chapters of the Branch. The funds will be added to the fundraising for the concrete canoe trailers. The plans and specifications for the canoe trailers are currently being developed. The CBU Student Chapter hosted a free viewing of the Dream Big video on campus on September 9th. Dr. Stephanie Ivy is starting a STEM club at East High and they had their first meeting in September. She ordered ASCE T-shirts and food for everyone in the club and they will attend the screening of Dream Big in the near future.

2016 Report Card for Tennessee - Solutions

The 2016 Report Card for Tennessee's Infrastructure Committee prepared a full report on the state of Tennessee's Infrastructure. The Report included 5 Key Solutions and Summarizes of each of the 10 areas highlighted. Over the next year the Tennessee Section will be highlighting the Key Solutions and respective infrastructure areas.

Solution #3

Raise awareness of the true cost of water. Current water rates do not reflect the true cost of supplying clean, reliable drinking water. Replacing Tennessee's antiquated pipes will require significant local investment, including higher water rates.

<u>Drinking Water - B</u>

Currently 485 public water systems in Tennessee serve 6.9 million customers, including industrial and commercial users. Approximately 90% of Tennessee's population is served by a public water system. Yet unaccounted water losses in water distribution systems of 40% or greater are common due to aging infrastructure. Tennessee utilities spent millions of dollars over the last 10 years to improve service to customers. The EPA estimates Tennessee's total 20-year drinking water infrastructure needs as \$2.7 billion.

Waste Water - D+

Like most states, Tennessee suffers from aging wastewater infrastructure. Tennessee has 242 municipal sewage treatment and collection systems regulated by National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permits, and they serve about two-thirds of the state's population. About 45% of the annual sewage flow treated in wastewater facilities originates from groundwater or rainwater leaking through deteriorated sewage pipes, joints, or manholes. Reports submitted by 55 systems show that they experienced peakday flows that exceeded facility capacity more than 60 days in a year. Combining the estimate of \$1.1 billion (to cut Infiltration/ Inflow leakage in half) with additional data in the US-EPA Clean Water Needs Survey (CWNS) shows an overall need of \$2.6 billion for Tennessee.

TN A&E Board Briefing

Rule and Policy changes:

- Rollover for Continuing Ed will no longer be allowed (effective date is likely sometime next year)
- Engineers can document Cont. Ed. on calendar year or renewal period
- A motion was passed by the Board to allow a 1:3 application of experience for work prior to a degree (max 1 year). This will allow internship, co-op, or other work experience gained prior to obtaining a degree to apply towards the four year experience requirement for licensure.
- On decoupling: The Board is still waiting for Society input. Kasey Anderson is organizing a committee made up of members from several societies in an attempt to develop a position to present to the Board.
- Meetings are recorded and live-streamed (not live this month).
